About the Conference

Climate change is almost universally recognized as one of the biggest challenges facing the international community. Agreement on the urgent need to tackle climate change has not, however, translated into strong action, let alone effective legally binding commitments. The most recent attempt to reach a global agreement, the Copenhagen Climate Conference, led to the adoption of what many described as a modest result: the Copenhagen Accord, a nonbinding document imposing no firm obligations.

Competing views on the value and importance of the Copenhagen Accord are abundant. Little debate exists, however, on the crucial role played by the United States, on the one hand, and the EU, on the other, in current and future deliberations on climate change. The United States and the EU have often, particularly in the recent past, disagreed on how best to address climate change. Such divisions have made the possibility of reaching a common agreement harder and complicated efforts to engage other key players, as well, such as *inter alia* China, India, Brazil, and the greater developing world. This divide was present at Copenhagen, too; however, the US and EU have cooperated successfully in the past to enable powerful solutions to global environmental problems. They can and should do so again.

The Greening the Transatlantic Alliance conference will analyze Copenhagen, examining key parties' bargaining positions and tactics with a critical eye toward what this outcome means for future negotiations. In particular, it will focus on the development of a global carbon market, a critical step towards successfully addressing climate change. With the creation of the European, Chicago and Northeast climate exchanges, Europe and the U.S. are leading the way. Building upon and bridging these initiatives will require bold and innovative thinking and the reciprocal sharing of experience and best practices to promote transatlantic understanding and cooperation on this critical issue.

This conference seeks to contribute to enhancing this important dialogue. The conference will open with a panel on the negotiating positions of the U.S. and E.U. at Copenhagen, and on the Copenhagen Accord and its implications for the upcoming Mexico City Conference. The second panel will examine carbon markets, as well as the industrial players involved in the production of emission credits. Panelists will also discuss the content of the Accord and present examples of how to enhance its cost-effectiveness and promote mitigation actions. Panel Three will look at the future of emission trading and the potential for a global carbon market. The panel will conclude by addressing new issues and prospects in view of Mexico City 2010.
